NEED HELP WITH YOUR HEATING BILL?

Starting October 1, 2016 the elderly and the disabled can apply for the 2016-2017 Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program, (LIHEAP) and anyone can apply after November 1, 2016. The assistance is based on household income, household size, type of fuel and type of housing.

You will need to take:

- ◆ Proof of Income (most recent 3 months’ check stubs)
 - ◆ Social Security numbers for all household members
 - ◆ Recent heat bill
 - ◆ Recent electric bill
 - ◆ Recent telephone bill

The New Way to Shop for Light.

When you're shopping for lightbulbs, compare lumens to be sure you're getting the amount of light, or level of brightness, you want. The lighting Facts label will help. This new label will make it easy to compare bulb brightness, color, life, and estimated operating cost for the year.

BUY LUMENS, NOT WATTS



You'll save about \$6 in energy costs each year if you replace one traditional 100W incandescent with an ENERGY STAR CFL.*

* Savings based on 2 hours per day usage and 11¢/kWh energy cost.

In the past, we bought lightbulbs based on how much energy, or watts, they use. Wouldn't it make more sense to buy lights based on how much light they provide?

When you're shopping for lightbulbs, you can choose your next lightbulb for the brightness you want by comparing

lumens instead of watts. A lumen is a measure of the amount of brightness of a light bulb — the higher the number of lumens, the brighter the lightbulb.

An ENERGY STAR® light bulb can save \$80 in electricity over its lifetime because it uses up to 90 percent less energy than traditional bulbs. ENERGY STAR bulbs also last 10 to 25 times longer, and produce far less heat, making them safer to operate.

Denison Municipal Utilities offers these rebates for ENERGY STAR lighting:

- CFL screw-in bulb - \$1.50
- LED screw-in bulb - \$3
- LED recessed can fixture - \$4


Did you know?

Lumens measure how much light you are getting from a bulb. More lumens means it's brighter light; fewer lumens means it's a dimmer light.

Lumens are to light what : * Pounds are to bananas * Gallons are to milk

The brightness, or lumen levels, of the lights in your home may vary widely, so here's a rule of thumb:

- To replace a 100 watt incandescent bulb, look for a bulb that gives you about 1600 lumens.
- Replace a 75 W bulb with an energy-saving bulb that gives you about 1100 lumens.
- Replace a 60 W bulb with an energy-saving bulb that gives you about 800 lumens.
- Replace a 40 W bulb with an energy-saving bulb that gives you about 450 lumens.



To help consumers better understand the switch from watts to lumens, the Federal Trade Commission requires a new product label. It helps people buy the lightbulbs that are right for them.

Like the helpful nutrition label on food products, the Lighting Facts label helps consumers understand what they are really purchasing. The label includes the following information:

- **Brightness, measured in lumens
- **Estimated yearly energy costs
- **Lifespan
- **Light appearance, measured by correlated color temperature (CCT) on the Kelvin (K) scale, from warm to cool.
